1	A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
2	AN ACT TO REGULATE THE PRACTICE OF DIETETICS/NUTRITION.
3	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
4	Section 1. The General Statutes are amended by adding a new Chapter to
5	read:
6	" <u>CHAPTER 90D.</u>
7	<u>''DIETETICS/NUTRITION.</u>
8	" <u>§ 90D-1. Short title.</u>
9	This Chapter shall be known as the Dietetics/Nutrition Practice Act.
10	" <u>§ 90D-2. Purpose.</u>
11	It is the purpose of this Chapter to safeguard the public health, safety and welfare
12	and to protect the public from being harmed by unqualified persons by providing for the
13	licensure and regulation of persons engaged in the practice of dietetics/nutrition and by
14	the establishment of educational standards for such persons.
15	" <u>§ 90D-3. Definitions.</u>
16	As used in this Chapter, unless the context otherwise requires, the term:
17	(1) <u>'Board' means the North Carolina Board of Dietetics/Nutrition.</u>
18	(2) <u>'Dietetics/nutrition' means the integration and application of principles</u>
19	derived from the science of nutrition, biochemistry, physiology, food,
20	management, and behavioral and social sciences to achieve and
21	maintain a healthy status. The primary function of dietetic/nutrition
22	practice is the provision of nutrition care services as herein defined.
23	(3) 'Licensed dietitian/nutritionist' means an individual licensed in good
24	standing to practice dietetics/nutrition as defined in this Chapter.

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1	<u>(4)</u>	'Nutrition care services' shall mean any, part or all of the following:
2		a. Assessing the nutritional needs of individuals and groups, and
3		determining resources and constraints in the practice setting.
4		b. Establishing priorities, goals, and objectives that meet
5		nutritional needs and are consistent with available resources and
6		constraints.
7		c. Providing nutrition counseling in health and disease.
8		d. Developing, implementing, and managing nutrition care
9		systems.
10		e. Evaluating, making changes in, and maintaining appropriate
11		standards of quality in food and nutrition services.
12	'Nuti	rition care services' shall not include the retail sale of food products or
13		vitamins.

15		North Carolina Board of Dietetics/Nutrition is created. The Board shall

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1	"§ 90D-5. Appointments and removal of Board members, terms and
2	compensation.
3	(a) The members of the Board shall be appointed as follows:
4	(1) The Governor shall appoint the professional member described in G.S.
5	90D-4(a)(5) and the two public members described in G.S. 90D-
6	4(a)(6);
7	(2) The General Assembly upon the recommendation of the Speaker of the
8	House of Representatives shall appoint the professional members
9	described in G.S. 90D-4(a)(1) and G.S. 90D-4(a)(2) in accordance
10	with G.S. 120-121; and
11	(3) The General Assembly upon the recommendation of the President Pro
12	Tempore of the Senate shall appoint the professional members
13	described in G.S. 90D-4(a)(3) and G.S. 90D-4(a)(4); in accordance
14	with G.S. 120-121.
15	(b) Of the members initially appointed, the professional member appointed by
16	the Governor, one of the professional members appointed by the General Assembly
17	upon the recommendation of the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and one of

20	three-year terms; one of the public members appointed by the Governor, one of the
21	professional members appointed by the General Assembly upon the recommendation of
22	the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and one of the professional members
23	appointed by the General Assembly upon the recommendation of the President Pro
24	Tempore of the Senate shall be appointed for two-year terms; and one of the public
25	members appointed by the Governor shall be appointed for a one-year term. After the
26	initial terms specified in this subsection, members of the Board shall take office on the
27	first day of July immediately following the expired term of that office and shall serve
28	for a term of three years and until their successors are appointed and qualified.
29	(c) No member shall serve on the Board for more than two consecutive terms.
30	(d) The Governor may remove members of the Board after notice and
31	opportunity for hearing, for:
32	(1) Incompetence;
33	$(2) \qquad \underline{\text{Neglect of duty;}}$
34	(3) <u>Unprofessional conduct:</u>
35	(4) <u>Conviction of any felony;</u>
36	(5) Failure to meet the qualifications of this Chapter; or
37	(6) Committing any act prohibited by this Chapter.
38	(e) Any vacancy shall be filled by the appointing authority originally filling that
39	position, except that any vacancy in appointments by the General Assembly shall be
40	filled in accordance with G.S. 120-122.
41	(f) Members of the Board shall receive no compensation for their services, but
42	shall be entitled to travel, per diem, and other expenses authorized by G.S. 93B-5.

15	<u>(4)</u>	Examine for, approve, issue, deny, revoke, suspend, and renew the

42		education requirements for persons seeking licensure under this

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1	Each applicant for a license as a licensed dietitian/nutritionist shall meet the
2	following requirements:
3	(1) <u>Has submitted a completed application as required by the Board; and</u>
4	(2) <u>Has submitted any fees required by the Board; and</u>
5	(3) <u>Either:</u>
6	a. <u>Has provided evidence of current registration as a Registered</u>
7	Dietitian by the Commission on Dietetic Registration; or
8	b. <u>1. Has received a minimum of a baccalaureate degree</u>
9	from a regionally accredited college or university with a
10	major course of study in human nutrition, food and
11	nutrition, dietetics, community nutrition, public health
12 13	nutrition, food systems management, or an equivalent
13 14	major course of study, as approved by the Board.
14 15	<u>Regardless of the course of study, applicants must have</u> successfully completed the Board's minimum course
15 16	requirements in food sciences, social and behavioral
10	sciences, chemistry, biology, human nutrition, diet
17	therapy, advanced nutrition, and food systems
18 19	management. Applicants who have obtained their
20	education outside of the United States and its territories
20	must have their academic degree(s) validated as
22	equivalent to a baccalaureate or masters degree conferred
23	by a regionally accredited college or university in the
24	United States; and
25	<u>2. Has completed a planned, continuous program in</u>
26	approved clinical practice of not less than 900 hours
27	under the supervision of a licensed dietitian/nutritionist
28	as approved by the Board; and
29	<u>3.</u> <u>Has passed an examination as defined by the Board.</u>
30	"§ 90D-9. Notification of applicant following evaluation of application.
31	After evaluation of the application and of any other evidence submitted, the Board
32	shall notify each applicant that the application and evidence submitted are satisfactory
33	and accepted or unsatisfactory and rejected. If rejected, the notice shall state the reasons
34	for the rejection.
35	" <u>§ 90D-10. Examinations.</u>
36	Competency examinations shall be administered at least twice each calendar year to
37	qualified applicants for licensing. The examinations may be administered by a national
38	testing service. The Board shall prescribe or develop the examinations which may
39	include an examination given by the Commission on Dietetic Registration of the
40	American Dietetic Association or any other examination approved by two-thirds vote of
41	the entire Board.
42	"§ 90D-11. Granting license without examination. The Deard many grant super employed and resument of graner fees a license
43	The Board may grant, upon application and payment of proper fees, a license without examination to a parson who at the time of application holds a valid license of a

1	licensed dietitian/nutritionist issued by another state or any political territory or
2	jurisdiction acceptable to the Board if in the Board's opinion the requirements for that
3	license are substantially the same as the requirements of this Chapter.
4	" <u>§ 90D-12. Provisional licenses.</u>
5	The Board may grant a provisional license for a period not exceeding 12 months to
6	any individual who has successfully completed the educational and clinical practice
7	requirements and has made application to take the examination required under G.S.
8	90D-8. A provisional license shall allow the individual to practice as a
9	dietitian/nutritionist under the supervision of a dietitian/nutritionist licensed in this State
10	and shall be valid until revoked by the Board.
11	" <u>§ 90D-13. License as constituting property of Board; display requirement;</u>
12	<u>renewal; inactive status.</u>
13	(a) A license issued by the Board is the property of the Board and must be
14	surrendered to the Board on demand.
15	(b) The licensee shall display the license certificate in the manner prescribed
16	by the Board.
17	(c) The licensee shall inform the Board of any change of his address.
18	(d) The license shall be reissued by the Board annually upon payment of a
19	renewal fee if the licensee is not in violation of this Chapter at the time of application
20	for renewal and if the applicant fulfills current requirements of continuing education as
21	established by the Board.
22	(e) Each person licensed under this Chapter is responsible for renewing his
23	license before the expiration date. The Board shall notify licensee of pending license
24	expiration at least 30 days in advance thereof.
25	(f) The Board may provide for the late renewal of a license upon the payment of
26	a late fee in accordance with G.S. 90D-15, but no such late fee renewal may be granted
27	more than five years after license expires.
28	(g) Under procedures and conditions established by the Board, a licensee may
29	request that his license be declared inactive. The licensee may apply for active status at
30	any time and upon meeting the conditions set by the Board shall be declared in active
31	<u>status.</u>
32	" <u>§ 90D-14. Suspension, revocation and refusal to renew license.</u>
33	(a) The Board may deny or refuse to renew a license, may suspend or revoke a
34	license, or may impose probationary conditions on a license if the licensee or applicant
35	for licensure has engaged in any of the following conduct:
36	(1) Employment of fraud, deceit or misrepresentation in obtaining or
37	attempting to obtain a license, or the renewal thereof;
38	(2) Committing an act or acts of malpractice, gross negligence or
39	incompetence in the practice of dietetics/nutrition;
40	(3) Practicing as a licensed dietitian/nutritionist without a current license;
41	(4) Engaging in conduct that could result in harm or injury to the public;
42	(5) Conviction of or a plea of guilty or nolo contendere to any crime
43	involving moral turpitude;

8	Sec. 3. This act shall become effective October 1, 1989.
