HOUSE BILL 610

Short Title: Martin Commissioners Election.

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT TO PROVIDE RESIDENCY DISTRICTS FOR ELECTION OF THE MARTIN COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS, TO IMPLEMENT A CONSENT ORDER IN THE CASE OF DANIELS V. BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF MARTIN COUNTY.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

Section 1. The Board of Commissioners of Martin County shall consist of five members, to be elected at-large by the entire electorate of the county, under a system of limited voting, as follows:

- (1) There shall be two residency districts created within the county as follows:
  - a. The WESTERN DISTRICT shall consist of the townships of Poplar Point, Goose Nest, Hamilton, Robersonville and Crossroads;
  - b. The EASTERN DISTRICT shall consist of the townships of Williamston, Bear Grass, Jamesville, Williams and Griffin;
- (2) Two of the five commissioners shall reside in the WESTERN DISTRICT. They shall be elected simultaneously, and each voter in the county shall be permitted to cast one vote in the primary, and one vote in the general election, for these two commission seats;
- (3) Three of the five commissioners shall reside in the EASTERN DISTRICT. They shall be elected simultaneously, and each voter in the county shall be permitted to cast two votes in the primary, and two votes in the general election, for these three commission seats.

1           (4)    The candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared  
2                    the winners of the primary, and of the general elections, respectively.  
3                    No run-off elections shall be held.

4           Sec. 2. Elections shall remain partisan, and terms of office shall continue to  
5 be four years, except as set forth in this act.

6           Sec. 3. This new system of election shall be implemented as follows:

7           (1)    A regular election was scheduled for election of two members of the  
8                    Board of Commissioners of Martin County for November 6, 1990.  
9                    The primary election for those seats was already held in April of 1990.  
10                  In light of the pending lawsuit and the desire of the parties to settle this  
11                  matter, this election was held under the old system of election, except  
12                  that the persons elected to office were elected to a two-year term,  
13                  instead of a four-year term of office;

14          (2)    All five seats on the Board of Commissioners of Martin County shall  
15                  come up for election in 1992. Both the primary and general elections  
16                  shall be held under the system of limited voting set out above, with  
17                  each voter casting one vote for the commissioners in the WESTERN  
18                  DISTRICT of the county, and casting two votes for the commissioners  
19                  in the EASTERN DISTRICT of the county. The two commissioners  
20                  elected to the WESTERN DISTRICT shall serve a two-year term;  
21                  these two seats will therefore be up for election again in 1994, and  
22                  every four years thereafter. The three commissioners elected to the  
23                  EASTERN DISTRICT shall serve a four-year term, and shall be up for  
24                  election again in 1996, and every four years thereafter.

25          (3)    Except as they may conflict with the provisions of this act, the laws of  
26                  the State of North Carolina shall continue to govern elections for the  
27                  Board of Commissioners of Martin County and the laws of the State  
28                  shall continue to govern and prescribe the powers and duties of the  
29                  Board of Commissioners.

30          Sec. 4. Chapter\_, Session Laws of \_-is repealed.

31          Sec. 5. This act is effective upon ratification.
