A BILL TO BE ENTITLED 1 2 AN ACT TO CLARIFY THE PROHIBITION AGAINST DISCLOSING TAX 3 INFORMATION, TO MODIFY THE PROHIBITION TO PERMIT THE EXCHANGE OF CERTAIN INFORMATION BETWEEN DESIGNATED 4 5 AGENCIES, AND TO EXCLUDE INFORMATION SUBMITTED ON A MASTER TAX APPLICATION FORM FROM THE PROHIBITION. 6 7 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts: 8 Section 1. G.S. 105-259 reads as rewritten: 9 "§ 105-259. Secrecy required of officials; penalty for violation. With respect to any one of the following persons: (i) 10 the Secretary of Revenue and all other officers or employees, and former officers and employees, of the 11 Department of Revenue; (ii) local tax officials, as defined in G.S. 105-273, and former 12 13 local tax officials; (iii) members and former members of the Property Tax Commission; (iv) any other person authorized in this section to receive information concerning any 14 item contained in any report or return, or authorized to inspect any report or return; and 15 (v) the Commissioner of Insurance and all other officers or employees and former 16 officers and employees of the Department of Insurance with respect to State and federal 17 income tax returns filed with the Commissioner of Insurance by domestic insurance 18 companies: and except in accordance with proper judicial order or as otherwise 19 20 provided by law, it shall be unlawful for any of these persons to divulge or make known in any manner the amount of income, income tax or other taxes of any taxpayer, or 21 22 information relating thereto or from which the amount of income, income tax or other

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taxes or any part thereof might be determined, deduced or estimated, whether it is set 1 2 forth or disclosed in or by means of any report or return required to be filed or furnished 3 under this Subchapter, or in or by means of any audit, assessment, application, 4 correspondence, schedule or other document relating to the taxpayer, notwithstanding 5 the provisions of Chapter 132 of the General Statutes or of any other law or laws 6 relating to public records. It shall likewise be unlawful to reveal whether or not any 7 taxpayer has filed a return, and to abstract, compile or furnish to any person, firm or 8 corporation not otherwise entitled to information relating to the amount of income, 9 income tax or other taxes of a taxpayer, any list of names, addresses, social security 10 numbers or other personal information concerning the taxpayer, whether or not the list discloses a taxpayer's income, income tax or other taxes, or any part thereof, except that 11 12 when an election is made by a husband and wife under G.S. 105-152.1 to file a joint 13 return, any information given to one spouse concerning the income or income tax of the 14 other spouse reported or reportable on the joint return shall not be a violation of the 15 provisions of this section. 16 Nothing in this section shall be construed to prohibit the publication of statistics, so 17 classified as to prevent the identification of particular reports or returns, and the items 18 thereof; the inspection of these reports or returns by the Governor, Attorney General, or 19 their duly authorized representative; or the inspection by a legal representative of the 20 State of the report or return of any taxpayer who shall bring an action to set aside or 21 review the tax based thereon, or against whom an action or proceeding has been 22 instituted to recover any tax or penalty imposed by this Subchapter; nor shall the 23 provisions of this section prohibit the Department of Revenue furnishing information to 24 other governmental agencies of persons and firms properly licensed under Schedule B, 25 G.S. 105-33 to 105-113. The Department of Revenue may exchange information with 26 the officers of organized associations of taxpayers under Schedule B, G.S. 105-33 to 27 105-113, with respect to parties liable for these taxes and as to parties who have paid 28 these license taxes. 29 When any record of the Department of Revenue has been photographed, 30 photocopied, or microphotocopied pursuant to the authority contained in G.S. 8-45.3, 31 the original of that record may thereafter be destroyed at any time upon the order of the 32 Secretary of Revenue, notwithstanding the provisions of G.S. 121-5, G.S. 132-2, or any 33 other law relating to the preservation of public records. Any record that has not been so 34 photographed, photocopied, or microphotocopied shall be preserved for three years, and 35 thereafter until the Secretary of Revenue orders it destroyed. Disclosure Prohibited. – An officer, an employee, or an agent of the State 36 (a) who has access to tax information in the course of service to or employment by the State 37 38 may not disclose the information to any other person unless the disclosure is made for 39 one of the following purposes: 40 To comply with a court order or a law. (1)To give a husband or wife who elects to file a joint individual income 41 (2)42 tax return information concerning the income tax liability of the other 43 spouse.

13	<u>(7)</u>	To exchange information with the Division of Motor Vehicles of the
14		Department of Transportation when the information is needed to fulfill
15		a duty imposed on the Department of Revenue or the Division of
16		Motor Vehicles.
17	<u>(8)</u>	To exchange information concerning a tax imposed by Subchapter V
18		of this Chapter with the Standards Division of the Department of
19		Agriculture when the information is needed to administer the Gasoline
20		and Oil Inspection Act, Article 3 of Chapter 119 of the General
21		Statutes.
22	<u>(9)</u>	To exchange information concerning a tax imposed by Article 2, 2A,
23		2B, 2C, or 2D of this Chapter with one of the following agencies when
24		the information is needed to fulfill a duty imposed on the agency:
25		<u>a.</u> <u>The North Carolina Alcoholic Beverage Control Commission.</u>
26		b. <u>The Division of Alcohol Law Enforcement of the Department</u>
27		of Crime Control and Public Safety.
28		c. <u>The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms of the United</u>
29		States Treasury Department.
30	<u>(10)</u>	To furnish to the Department of State Treasurer the name, address, and
31		account and identification numbers of a taxpayer who may be entitled
32	(11)	to property held in the Escheat Fund.
33	<u>(11)</u>	To furnish to the Employment Security Commission the name,
34		address, and account and identification numbers of a taxpayer when
35		the information is needed to enable the Commission to fulfill a duty

Punishment. - Any person, officer, agent, clerk, employee, or local tax official 1 (b) 2 or any former officer, employee, or local tax official A person who violates the provisions of this section shall be is guilty of a misdemeanor and may be fined not less 3 4 than two hundred dollars (\$200.00) nor more than one thousand dollars (\$1,000) and/or 5 imprisoned, in the discretion of the court; and if (\$1,000), imprisoned for up to two years, or both. If the person committing the violation is a public an officer or employee, 6 7 that person shall be dismissed from such office or employment, and may not hold any 8 public office or employment in this State for a period of five years thereafter. 9 Notwithstanding the provisions of this section, the Secretary of Revenue may permit 10 the Commissioner of Internal Revenue of the United States, or the revenue officer of any other state imposing any of the taxes imposed in this Subchapter, or the duly 11 12 authorized representative of either, to inspect the report or return of any taxpayer; or 13 may furnish that person an abstract of the report or return of any taxpayer; or supply that 14 person with information concerning any item contained in any report or return, or 15 disclosed by the report of any investigation of any report or return of any taxpayer. The 16 permission, however, may be granted or the information furnished to the officer or 17 agent only if the statutes of the United States or of the other state grant substantially 18 similar privilege to the Secretary of Revenue of this State or the Secretary's duly 19 authorized representative. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the Secretary 20 may also furnish names, addresses, and account and identification numbers of (i) 21 taxpayers who may be entitled to property held in the Escheat Fund to the 22 Department of State Treasurer when that Department requests the information for the 23 purpose of administering Chapter 116B of the General Statutes, and (ii) taxpayers to the 24 Employment Security Commission when that Commission requests the information for 25 the purpose of administering Article 2 of Chapter 96 of the General Statutes. Neither 26 this section nor any other law prevents the exchange of information between the 27 Department of Revenue and the Department of Transportation's Division of Motor 28 Vehicles when the information is needed by either to administer the laws with which 29 they are charged. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, State officers and 30 employees who perform computerized data processing functions pursuant to G.S. 143-31 341(9) for the Department of Revenue are authorized to receive and process for the 32 Department of Revenue information in reports and returns and are subject to the 33 criminal provisions of this section. 34 Notwithstanding the provisions of this section, the Secretary of Revenue may 35 contract with any person, firm or corporation to receive and address, sort, bag, or deliver to the United States Postal Service any bulk mailing originated by the Department of 36 37 Revenue, and may deliver the mail to the contractor pursuant to the contract. To ensure 38 performance of the contract, the contractor shall furnish a bond in a form and amount 39 acceptable to the Secretary. 40 Definitions. – The following definitions apply in this section: (c) Employee or officer. The term includes a former employee, a former (1)

18	assessing taxable property, collecting taxes, or presenting information		
19	in administrative or judicial proceedings involving the listing,

21	A local tax official may use information obtained from the Department under this		
22	subsection only for the purposes stated in subdivision (2). A local tax official may not		
23	divulge or make public this information except as required in administrative or judicial		
24	proceedings under this Subchapter. A local tax official who makes improper use of or		
25	discloses information obtained from the Department under this subsection is punishable		
26	as provided in G.S. 105-259. guilty of a misdemeanor and is punishable by a fine not to		
27	exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000), imprisonment for up to two years, or both.

29	subsection unless it has obtained a written certification from the official stating that he

34	"§ 105-449.57. Cooperative agreements between states.		
35	The Secretary may enter into cooperative agreements with other states for exchange		
36	of information in administering the tax imposed by this Article. No agreement,		
37	arrangement, declaration, or amendment to an agreement is effective until stated in		
38	writing and approved by the Secretary.		
39	An agreement may provide for determining the base state for motor carriers, records		
40	requirements, audit procedures, exchange of information, persons eligible for tax		
41	licensing, defining qualified motor vehicles, determining if bonding is required,		
42	specifying reporting requirements and periods, including defining uniform penalty and		
43	interest rates for late reporting, determining methods for collecting and forwarding of		

gasoline or other motor fuel taxes and penalties to another jurisdiction, and such other
provisions as will facilitate the administration of the agreement.

3 Notwithstanding the provisions of G.S. 105-259 to the contrary, In accordance with G.S.

4 <u>105-259</u>, the Secretary may, as required by the terms of an agreement, forward to 5 officials of another state any information in the Department's possession relative to the 6 use of gasoline or other motor fuels by any motor carrier. The Secretary may disclose 7 to officials of another state the location of offices, motor vehicles, and other real and 8 personal property of motor carriers.

An agreement may provide for each state to audit the records of motor carriers based 9 10 in the state to determine if the gasoline or other motor fuel taxes due each state are properly reported and paid. Each state shall forward the findings of the audits 11 12 performed on motor carriers based in the state to each state in which the carrier has 13 taxable use of gasoline or other motor fuels. For motor carriers not based in this State 14 who have taxable use of gasoline or other motor fuels in this State, the Secretary may 15 utilize the audit findings received from another state as the basis upon which to propose 16 assessments of gasoline or other motor fuel taxes against the carrier as though the audit 17 had been conducted by the Secretary. Penalties and interest shall be assessed at the 18 rates provided in the agreement.

No agreement entered into pursuant to this section may preclude the Departmentfrom auditing the records of any motor carrier covered by this Chapter.

The provisions of Article 9 of this Chapter apply to any assessment or order made under this section.

The Secretary may not enter into any agreement that would increase or decrease taxes and fees imposed under Subchapter V of Chapter 105 of the General Statutes, and any provision to the contrary is void."

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Sec. 7. G.S. 132-1.1 reads as rewritten:

27 "§ 132-1.1. Confidential communications by legal counsel to public board or
28 agency; not public records. State tax information.

Confidential Communications. - Public records, as defined in G.S. 132-1, 29 (a) 30 shall not include written communications (and copies thereof) to any public board, council, commission or other governmental body of the State or of any county, 31 municipality or other political subdivision or unit of government, made within the scope 32 33 of the attorney-client relationship by any attorney-at-law serving any such governmental body, concerning any claim against or on behalf of the governmental body or the 34 35 governmental entity for which such body acts, or concerning the prosecution, defense, settlement or litigation of any judicial action, or any administrative or other type of 36 proceeding to which the governmental body is a party or by which it is or may be 37 38 directly affected. Such written communication and copies thereof shall not be open to 39 public inspection, examination or copying unless specifically made public by the governmental body receiving such written communications; provided, however, that 40 such written communications and copies thereof shall become public records as defined 41 42 in G.S. 132-1 three years from the date such communication was received by such public board, council, commission or other governmental body. 43

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1	(b) State Tax Information. – Tax information may not be disclosed except as
2	provided in G.S. 105-259. As used in this subsection, 'tax information' has the same
3	meaning as in G.S. 105-259."
4	Sec. 8. G.S. 132-3 reads as rewritten:
5	"§ 132-3. Destruction of records regulated.
6	(a) <u>Prohibition. – No public official may destroy</u> , sell, loan, or otherwise dispose
7	of any public record, except in accordance with G.S. 121-5, without the consent of the
8	Department of Cultural Resources. Whoever unlawfully removes a public record from
9	the office where it is usually kept, or alters, defaces, mutilates or destroys it shall be
10	guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction fined not less than ten dollars (\$10.00) nor
11	more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00).
12	(b) <u>Revenue Records. – Notwithstanding subsection (a) and G.S. 121-5, when a</u>
13	record of the Department of Revenue has been photographed, photocopied, or
14	microphotocopied, the original record may be destroyed upon the order of the Secretary
15	of Revenue. If a record of the Department of Revenue has not been photographed,
16	photocopied, or microphotocopied, the original record shall be preserved for at least
17	three years. After three years the original record may be destroyed upon the order of the
18	Secretary of Revenue."
19	• Sec. 9. This act is effective upon ratification.
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
