INNS. The General As Secti "§ 130A-247. I	'Permanent house guest' means a person who receives room or board for periods of a week or longer. The term includes visitors of the permanent house guest.  'Private club' means an establishment which maintains selective
(3)	members, is operated by the membership, does not provide food or lodging for pay to anyone who is not a member or a member's guest, and is not profit oriented.  'Regular boarder' means a person who receives food for periods of a
(4)	week or longer.  'Where drink is prepared or served' means a place where drink is put together, portioned, set out or handed out in unpackaged portions using containers which are reused on the premises rather than single-service containers.
(5)	'Where food is prepared or served' means a place where food is cooked, put together, portioned, set out or handed out in unpackaged portions for human consumption.

1	<u>(6)</u>	'Bed and breakfast inn' means a business establishment of not more
2		than 12 guest rooms that offers bed and breakfast accommodations to
3		at least nine but not more than 23 persons per night for a period of less
4		than one week, and that:
5		a. Does not serve food or drink to the general public for pay;
6		b. Serves only the breakfast meal, and that meal is served only to
7		overnight guests of the establishment;
8		c. <u>Includes the price of breakfast in the room rate; and</u>
9		<ul> <li><u>Includes the price of breakfast in the room rate; and</u></li> <li><u>Is the permanent residence of the owner or the manager of the</u></li> </ul>

14	to eight or less p	persons per night. night, and rules governing the sanitation of bed and
15	breakfast inns as	s defined in G.S. 130A-247; provided that rules governing bed and
16	breakfast inns sha	all not require any of the following:
17	<u>(1)</u>	Commercial grade, stainless steel NSF-approved kitchen equipment;
18	<u>(2)</u>	Private toilet and lavatory facilities in each guest room;
19	<u>(3)</u>	Kitchen used exclusively for the preparation of food served to guests;
20		<u>or</u>
21	<u>(4)</u>	Separate rest rooms for employees."
