1	A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
2	AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR A BINDING REFERENDUM ON THE
3	ESTABLISHMENT OF A NORTH CAROLINA STATE LOTTERY.
4	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
5	Section 1. The General Statutes are amended by adding a new Chapter to
6	read:
7	" <u>CHAPTER 143C.</u>
8	<u>"NORTH CAROLINA STATE LOTTERY.</u>
9	"ARTICLE 1.
10	''GENERAL PROVISIONS AND DEFINITIONS.
11	" <u>§ 143C-101. Citation.</u>
12	This Chapter shall be known and may be cited as the North Carolina State Lottery
13	<u>Act.</u>
14	" <u>§ 143C-102. Purpose and intent.</u>
15	The General Assembly declares that the purpose and intent of this Chapter is to
16	provide additional monies to benefit the public purpose described in this Chapter
17	without the imposition of additional or increased taxes through the implementation of a
18	State-operated lottery. The lottery shall be initiated at the earliest practical time and it
19	shall be operated to maximize new revenue to the State which shall be raised in a
20	manner consistent with the dignity of the State, the general welfare of the people, and in
21	a manner consistent with effective business practices.
22	" <u>§ 143C-103. Laws not affected.</u>
23	Nothing contained in this Chapter shall be construed to repeal or modify any
24	existing State law with respect to gambling. In the event of a conflict between the

1	provisions of t	his Chapter and any other laws of the State of North Carolina, the
2	<u>^</u>	is Chapter shall govern.
3	<u>^</u>	Prohibition on use of State funds.
4	It is the int	ent of this Chapter that the State-operated lottery established by this
5	Chapter shall be	e a self-supporting revenue-raising agency of State government.
6	" <u>§ 143C-105.</u> I	Public purpose to benefit from lottery.
7	The net reve	enues of the lottery shall be used to benefit the public purposes set forth
8	in G.S. 143C-1	75. It is the intent of this Chapter that the net revenues generated by the
9	State-operated	lottery established by this Chapter shall not supplant revenues already
10	expended or pr	rojected to be expended for the public purpose and that lottery net
11	revenues shall s	supplement rather than be used as substitute funds for the total amount of
12	money allocated	d for the public purpose.
13	" <u>§ 143C-106.</u> A	Allocation of revenues.
14	As nearly as	practical, at least eighty-four percent (84%) of the total annual revenues
15	from the sale of	f lottery tickets or shares, as described in this Chapter, shall be returned
16	to the public in	the form of prizes and net revenues benefiting the public purposes set
17	forth in G.S. 14	3C-175. As nearly as practical, at least fifty percent (50%) of the total
18	annual revenues	s, as described in this Chapter, shall be returned to the public in the form
19	*	scribed in this Chapter. Unclaimed prize money, as described in this
20	Chapter, shall r	revert to the benefit of the public purpose as described in this Chapter.
21		actical, no more than sixteen percent (16%) of the total annual revenues

4	of this Chapter.
5	(d) <u>Vacancies shall be filled within 30 days of their occurrence by the</u>
6	Governor for the unexpired portion of the term in which they occur.
7	(e) If a vacancy arises or exists when the General Assembly is not in session, the
8	Governor shall appoint a commissioner to serve on an interim basis pending
9	confirmation by the General Assembly at its next session.
10	" <u>§ 143C-112. Qualifications of Commissioners.</u>
11	At least one of the Commissioners shall have a minimum of five years experience in
12	law enforcement, and at least one of the other Commissioners shall be a certified public accountant. No person shall be appointed as a Commissioner who has been convicted
13 14	of a felony.
14	"§ 143C-113. Compensation and expenses.
16	<u>Commissioners shall be compensated at the rate of one hundred dollars (\$100.00)</u>
17	for each day engaged in Commission business. Commissioners shall be reimbursed for
18	actual expenses incurred on Commission business, including necessary travel expenses.
19	"§ 143C-114. Powers and duties of the Commission.
20	<u>The Commission shall exercise all powers necessary to effectuate the purposes of</u>
21	this Chapter.

23	The Commission shall annually select a chairman from its membership.
24	"§ 143C-116. Meetings; records.
25	Meetings of the Commission shall be open and public in accordance with Article
26	<u>33C of Chapter 143 of the General Statutes. Records of the Commission shall be open</u>
27	and available to the public in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 132 of the
28	General Statutes. The Commission shall meet with the Director at least monthly to
29	make recommendations and set policy, to approve or reject reports of the Director, to
30	adopt rules in accordance with Chapter 150B of the General Statutes, and to transact
31	any other business that may properly be brought before it. The chairman or a majority
32	of the members of the Commission shall have the power to call special meetings of the
33	Commission upon advance written notice to all of the members of the Commission and
34	the Director.
35	" <u>§ 143C-117. Quorum; voting.</u>
36	A majority of the total membership of the North Carolina Lottery Commission
37	constitutes a quorum. All decisions of the Commission shall be made by a majority
38	vote.
39	" <u>§ 143C-118. Reports.</u>
40	The Commission shall make quarterly and annual reports on the operation of the
41	lottery to the Governor, Attorney General, State Treasurer, and to the General
42	Assembly. The reports shall include full and complete statements of lottery revenues,
43	prize disbursements, expenses, net revenues, and all other financial transactions
44	involving lottery funds.

No person shall be employed by the lottery who has been convicted of a 28 29 felony. Each person employed by the lottery shall execute an authorization to allow an 30 investigation of his background. "§ 143C-125. Assistant directors. 31 32 The Director may appoint, and prescribe the duties for, up to four assistant directors. The compensation of each assistant director shall be set by the Commission and shall 33 not exceed the Director's compensation. The Director may designate one of the 34 35 assistant directors as the deputy director. All employees of the North Carolina State 36 Lottery shall be exempt from the State Personnel Act. "§ 143C-126. Assistant director for security. 37 38 One of the assistant directors shall be responsible for a security division to assure the 39 security, honesty, fairness, and integrity in the operation and administration of the lottery, including an examination of the background of all prospective employees, 40 lottery vendors, and lottery contractors. The assistant director for security shall be 41 qualified by training and experience, including at least five years of law enforcement 42 experience and knowledge and experience in computer security. The assistant director 43 44 for security may, in conjunction with the Director, confer with the Attorney General or

1	his designee, to promote and ensure the security, honesty, fairness, and integrity of the
2	operation and administration of the lottery. The assistant director for security, in
3	conjunction with the Director, shall report any alleged violation of law to the
4	appropriate law enforcement authority for further investigation and action. The
5	assistant director for security shall have peace officer status in this State.
6	" <u>§ 143C-127. Criminal identification information available to lottery; peace officer</u>
7	<u>status.</u>
8	Upon the request of the assistant director for security, the Attorney General and the
9	Secretary of Crime Control and Public Safety shall furnish information to the Director
10	and the assistant director for security, necessary to assure the security, honesty, fairness,
11	and integrity in the operation and administration of the lottery which they have in their
12	possession, including computerized or other information and data. For the purpose of
13	requesting and receiving this information, the State lottery shall be considered to be a
14	'criminal justice agency' and its enforcement agents to be 'peace officers'. State lottery
15	enforcement agents shall have the same authority with respect to service and execution
16	of arrest warrants and search warrants as is conferred on other peace officers of this
17	State.
18	" <u>§ 143C-128. Coordination with Commission.</u>
19	The Director shall confer as frequently as necessary, but not less than monthly, with
20	the Commission on the operation and administration of the lottery. The Director shall
21	make available for inspection by the Commission all books, records, files, documents,
22	and other information of the lottery and shall make recommendations for the improved
23	operation and administration of the lottery.
24	" <u>§ 143C-129. Study of lottery systems; recommendations for improvement.</u>
25	The Director shall make an ongoing study of the operation and administration of the
26	lotteries that are in operation in other states and countries, of available literature on the
27	subject of lotteries, of federal laws which may affect the operation of the lottery, and of
28	the reaction of the citizens of the State to existing or proposed features in lottery games.
29	The Director shall conduct this research in order to recommend improvements that will
30	serve the purposes of this Chapter. The Director may make recommendations to the
31	Commission, to the Governor, and to the General Assembly on any matters concerning
32	the secure, profitable, and efficient operation and administration of the lottery and the
33	convenience of the purchasers of tickets and shares.
34	" <u>§ 143C-130. Accountability; books and records.</u>
35	The Director shall make and keep books and records that accurately and fairly
36	reflect each day's transactions, including the distribution of tickets or shares to lottery
37	game retailers, receipt of funds, prize claims, prizes paid directly by the Commission,
38	expenses, and all other financial transactions involving lottery funds necessary to permit
39	preparation of daily financial statements in conformity with generally accepted
40	accounting principles, in order to maintain daily accountability.
41	" <u>§ 143C-131. Monthly financial reports.</u>
42	The Director shall make a monthly financial report to the Commission, to the
12	Covernor to the State Treasurer and to the Coneral Assembly. The report shall include

8	report shall be presented to the Commission, to the Governor, and to the General
9	Assembly. Similar studies shall be conducted on a continuing, periodic basis.
10	"§ 143C-133. Independent study of effectiveness of lottery communications.
11	After the first full year of sales of tickets or shares to the public, the Director shall
12	engage an independent firm experienced in the analysis of advertising, promotion,
13	public relations, and other aspects of communications to conduct a special study of the
14	effectiveness of the communications activities undertaken by the lottery and make
15	recommendations to the Commission on the future conduct and future rate of
16	expenditures for these activities. This report shall be presented to the Commission, to
17	the Governor, and to the General Assembly. Similar studies shall be conducted on a
18	continuing, periodic basis.
19	" <u>§ 143C-134. Independent audit of lottery security.</u>
20	The Director shall, in addition to all other security measures, engage an independent
21	firm experienced in security procedures, including computer security and systems
22	security, to conduct a continuing comprehensive study and evaluation of all aspects of
23	security in the operation of the lottery. The study shall include:
24	(1) <u>Personnel security;</u>
25	(2) Lottery game retailer security;
26	(3) Lottery contractor security;
27	(4) <u>Security of manufacturing operations of lottery contractors;</u>
28	(5) <u>Security against ticket counterfeiting, alteration, and other</u>
29	means of fraudulently winning; security of drawings among entries
30	or finalists;
31	(6) <u>Computer security;</u>
32	(7) Data communications security;
33	(8) Database security;
34	(9) <u>Systems security</u>
35	(10) Lottery premises and warehouse security;

5	Director, to the assistant director for security, and to the Commission. Similar audits of
6	security shall be conducted biennially thereafter.

9	"OPERATION OF LOTTERY.
10	" <u>§ 143C-140. Initiation and operation of lottery.</u>
11	The Commission shall initiate operation of the lottery on a continuous basis at the
12	earliest feasible and practical time. The lottery shall be initiated and shall continue to be
13	operated so as to produce the maximum amount of net revenues to benefit the public
14	purpose described in this Chapter consistent with the purposes stated in G.S. 143C-102.
15	Other departments, boards, commissions, and agencies of the State and their officers
16	shall cooperate with the Commission to aid the Commission in fulfilling these
17	objectives.
18	" <u>§ 143C-141. Types of lottery games.</u>
19	(a) Upon the recommendation of the Director, the Commission shall adopt rules,
20	in the manner prescribed by Chapter 150B of the General Statutes, specifying the types
21	of lottery games to be conducted by the lottery, including but not limited to, instant
22	lotteries, on-line games, and other games traditional to the lottery, provided, however:
23	(1) No lottery game may use the theme of bingo, dog racing, or horse
24	racing;
25	(2) No lottery game may be based on the outcome of a particular sporting
26	event or on the results of a series of sporting events;
27	(3) In lottery games using tickets, each ticket in a particular game shall
28	bear a unique number distinguishing it from every other ticket in that
29	lottery game;
30	(4) No name or photograph of an elected official shall appear on the
31	tickets of any lottery game; and
32	(5) In games using electronic computer terminals or other devices, no
33	coins or currency shall be dispensed to players from those electronic
34	computer terminals or devices.
35	(b) The Commission may authorize the use of any type of lottery game that
36	has been conducted by any state government-operated lottery in the United States
37	including, but not limited to, the sale of instant tickets or shares by electronic computer
38	terminals or devices, or any other type of lottery game that will achieve the revenue
39	objectives of the lottery consistent with the purposes stated in G.S. 143C-102.
40	" <u>§ 143C-142. Number and value of prizes.</u>
41	Upon the recommendation of the Director, the Commission shall adopt rules as
42	prescribed by Chapter 150B of the General Statutes that specify the number and value
43	of prizes for winning tickets or shares in each lottery game including cash prizes,
44	merchandise prizes, prizes consisting of deferred payments or annuities, and prizes of

1		es in the same lottery game or other lottery games conducted by the

3	<u>(1)</u>	In lottery games using tickets with preprinted winners, the overall
4		estimated odds of winning prizes shall be printed on each ticket;
5	<u>(2)</u>	A detailed tabulation of the estimated number of prizes of each

7		lottery game, or the estimated odds of winning these prizes, shall be
8		available at the offices of the lottery at the time that lottery game is
9		offered for sale to the public; and

21		(6) <u>Holders of tickets or shares shall have the right to claim</u>

25		or finalists. If a valid claim is not made for a prize payable directly
26		by the Commission within the applicable period, the unclaimed prize
27		money will revert to the North Carolina State Lottery Fund;
28		(7) After the expiration of the claim period for prizes for each
29		lottery game, the Commission shall make available a detailed
30		tabulation of the total number of prizes of each prize denomination
31		that were actually claimed and paid directly by the Commission;
32	<u>(8)</u>	The right of any person to a prize shall not be assignable, except that
33		payment of any prize may be paid to the estate of a deceased
34		prizewinner or to a person designated pursuant to an appropriate
