12	This Chapter shall be known and may be cited as the North Carolina State Lottery
13	<u>Act.</u>

15	The General Assembly declares that the purpose and intent of this Chapter is to
16	provide additional monies to benefit the public purposes described in this Chapter
17	without the imposition of additional or increased taxes through the implementation of a
18	State-operated lottery. The lottery shall be initiated at the earliest practical time and it
19	shall be operated to maximize new revenue to the State. That new revenue shall be
20	raised in a manner consistent with the dignity of the State and the general welfare of the
21	people, and in a manner consistent with effective business practices.

41 The Governor shall appoint a Director within 30 days of the effective date of this
42 <u>Chapter. The Director shall direct the operations of the Commission. The Governor</u>
43 may remove the Director upon notification to the Commission. The Director shall be
44 <u>exempt from the State Personnel Act.</u>

2	No person shall be appointed Director who has been convicted of a felony.

4	During the first fiscal year of the operation of the Commission, the Director shall

32	Commission. The assistant director for security shall be qualified by training and
33	experience including at least five years of law enforcement experience and knowledge
34	and experience in computer security. The assistant director for security may, in
35	conjunction with the Director, confer with the Attorney General or the Attorney
36	General's designee, to promote and ensure the security, honesty, fairness, and integrity
37	of the operation and administration of the Commission. The assistant director for
38	security, in conjunction with the Director, shall report any alleged violation of law to the
39 40	appropriate law enforcement authority for further investigation and action. The
40 41	assistant director for security shall be required to be a sworn law enforcement officer in this State.

1 Upon the request of the assistant director for security, the Attorney General and the 2 Secretary of Crime Control and Public Safety shall furnish information to the Director 3 and the assistant director for security necessary to assure the security, honesty, fairness, and integrity in the operation and administration of the Commission and its licensees 4 5 that they have in their possession, including computerized or other information and data. 6 For the purpose of requesting and receiving this information, the Commission shall be 7 considered to be a 'criminal justice agency' and its enforcement agents to be 'law 8 enforcement officers'. Commission's enforcement agents shall have the same authority 9 with respect to service and execution of arrest warrants and search warrants as is 10 conferred on other law enforcement officers of this State. "§ 143C-128. Coordination with Commission. 11 The Director shall confer as frequently as necessary, but not less than monthly, with 12 13 the Commission on the operation and administration of the Commission. The Director 14 shall make available for inspection by the Commission all books, records, files, 15 documents, and other information of the lottery and shall make recommendations for 16 the improved operation and administration of the Commission and lottery games. 17 "§ 143C-129. Study of lottery systems; recommendations for improvement. 18 The Director shall make an ongoing study of the operation and administration of other lotteries and commissions and lottery games that are in operation in other states 19 20 and countries, of available literature on the subject of lotteries, of federal laws that may 21 affect the operation of the Commission and lottery games, and of the reaction of the 22 citizens of the State to existing or proposed features in lottery games. The Director shall conduct this research in order to recommend improvements that will serve the purposes 23 of this Chapter. The Director may make recommendations to the Commission, to the 24 Governor, and to the General Assembly on any matters concerning the secure, 25 profitable, and efficient operation and administration of the Commission and of lottery 26 27 games and the convenience of the purchasers of tickets and shares. 28 "§ 143C-130. Accountability; books and records. 29 The Director shall make and keep books and records that accurately and fairly 30 reflect each day's transactions, including the distribution of tickets or shares to lottery game retailers, receipt of funds, prize claims, prizes paid directly by the Commission, 31 expenses, and all other financial transactions involving lottery funds necessary to permit 32 33 preparation of daily financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles, in order to maintain daily accountability. 34 35 "§ 143C-131. Monthly financial reports. The Director shall make a monthly financial report to the Commission, to the 36 Governor, to the State Controller, to the State Treasurer, and to the General Assembly. 37 38 The report shall include a statement of all lottery revenues, prize disbursements, 39 expenses, net revenues, and all other financial transactions involving lottery funds for the preceding month. 40 "§ 143C-132. Independent study of demographics of lottery players. 41 42 Within the first six months of sales of tickets or shares to the public, the Director shall engage an independent firm experienced in demographic analysis to conduct a 43 44 special study to ascertain the demographic characteristics of the players of each lottery

2	report shall be presented to the Commission, to the Governor, and to the General
3	Assembly. Similar studies shall be conducted on a continuing, periodic basis.
4	"§ 143C-133. Independent study of effectiveness of lottery communications.
5	Until the study required by this section is conducted and the results have been
6	reviewed by the General Assembly, expenditures for advertising of the lottery shall not
7	exceed four percent (4%) of all proceeds from the sales of lottery tickets or shares.
8	After the first full year of sales of tickets or shares to the public, the Director shall
9	engage an independent firm experienced in the analysis of advertising, promotion,
10	public relations, and other aspects of communications to conduct a special study of the
11	effectiveness of the communications activities undertaken by the Commission and make
12	recommendations to the Commission on the future conduct and future rate of
13	expenditures for these activities. This report shall be presented to the Commission, to
14	the Governor, and to the General Assembly. Similar studies shall be conducted on a

42		tabulation of the total number of prizes of each prize denomination
43		that was actually claimed and paid directly by the Commission;

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1 2	<u>(8)</u>	The right of any person to a prize shall not be assignable, except that payment of any prize may be paid to the estate of a deceased
3		prizewinner or to a person designated pursuant to an appropriate
4 5		judicial order. The Director, Commission, and the State shall be discharged of all liability upon payment of a prize; and
6	(9)	No ticket or share in a lottery game shall be purchased by, and no prize
7		shall be paid to, a member of the Commission, the Director, an
