1	A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
2	AN ACT TO ESTABLISH A GRANT PROGRAM TO STRENGTHEN FAMILY
3	RESOURCES AND APPROPRIATE FUNDS FOR ITS IMPLEMENTATION.
4	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
5	Section 1. A new Part is added to Article 3 of Chapter 143B of the General
6	Statutes to read:
7	'' <u>PART 4B.</u>
8	''FAMILY RESOURCES GRANT PROGRAM.
9	"§ 143B-151. Purpose.
10	It is the intent of the General Assembly to encourage and support broad-based
11	collaboration among governmental and nongovernmental agencies and persons
12	reflective of the racial and socioeconomic diversity in local communities in order to
13	develop initiatives designed to (i) prepare children to learn effectively and to have a
14	successful school experience, (ii) enhance the ability of families to become advocates
15	for and supporters of education for the children in their families, and (iii) enhance the
16	ability of families to function as nurturing and effective family units.
17	" <u>§ 143B-151.1 Family Resources Grant Program; creation; administration; family</u>
18	resource center grants; innovation grants.
19	(a) <u>There is created in the Department of Human Resources a Family Resources</u>
20	Grant Program. The program shall be administered by the Secretary of Human
21	Resources, upon the advice of the Interagency Task Force on Family Resources, created
22	in G.S. 143B-151.2.

1	(b) Beginning with the 1994-95 fiscal year, the program shall provide family
2	resource center grants for individual public schools or consortia of public schools to
3	establish family resource centers in or near the schools. A school or consortia of
4	schools may apply for a grant if at least twenty-five percent (25%) of the students
5	enrolled at the school or at the consortia of schools are eligible for free meals. The
6	purpose of the family resource centers is to provide services to children from
7	prekindergarten through the sixth grade and their families that are designed to enhance
8	the children's ability to attain academic and social success.
9	(c) Beginning with the 1993-94 fiscal year, the program shall provide innovation
10	grants to consortia of governmental and nongovernmental agencies and other persons.
11	The composition of the consortia shall generally reflect the racial and socioeconomic
12	diversity in their local communities. The purpose of these grants is to initiate or further
13	develop innovative models for the effective, comprehensive, and collaborative delivery
14	of services to children at risk of not attaining academic and social success and their
15	<u>families.</u>
16	(d) Applications for these grants, whether for family resource centers under
17	subsection (b) of this section or innovative models under subsection (c) of this section,
18	shall be developed on the basis of currently available resources, and on the basis of
19	additional resources that can be utilized to enhance the effectiveness of currently
20	available resources.

23	Force shall be located administratively within the Department of Human Resources but

9	Sec. 3. The Frank Porter Graham Center at the University of North Carolina
10	at Chapel Hill shall conduct a short-term program evaluation and shall develop a system
11	to measure and analyze the long-term goals and outcomes of the Family Resources
12	Grant Program established in Section 1 of this act, and shall file a written report no later
13	than February 15, 1995, with the chair of the Interagency Task Force on Family
14	Resources, the Governor, the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, the Speaker of the

38	shall be based on the guidelines established under G.S. 143B-
39	151.3(a)(2).
