Referred to: Children and Human Resources February 3, 1993 1 A BILL TO BE ENTITLED 2 AN ACT TO REQUIRE THAT THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN RESOURCES 3 STUDY THE ISSUE OF REIMBURSEMENT FOR DOMICILIARY CARE 4 HOMES AND RECOMMEND A SPECIFIC METHOD FOR RATE SETTING. 5 Whereas, G.S. 131D-3 establishes cost and revenue reporting requirements for domiciliary homes; and 6 7 Whereas, the North Carolina General Assembly specifically sets the 8 State/county special assistance rates that reimburse domiciliary homes; and 9 Whereas, the rates for these homes may not bear any real relationship to the 10 cost data: and 11 Whereas, there may be a better method for rate setting than this one being currently used; Now, therefore, 12 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts: 13 Section 1. The Department of Human Resources shall study the issue of 14 15 reimbursement for domiciliary care homes and shall recommend a specific method for rate setting. 16 17 This study shall consider: What the purpose of domiciliary care is and should be; 18 (1) What the structure of the rates shall be; 19 (2) How the levels of payment should be determined; 20 (3) How the system of rate setting shall be administered: 21 **(4)** 22 What the adequate number of domiciliary care beds is and whether this (5)

number should be controlled by the State; and

Any other issue the Department finds necessary to study.

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The Department shall report its progress on the study to the North Carolina Study Commission on Aging on or before October 1, 1993. The Department shall make a final report of the results of its study, together with any legislative proposals, to the 1993 General Assembly by March 1, 1994.

Sec. 2. This act is effective upon ratification.
