1 AN ACT TO ALLOW THE ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE CONTROL COMMISSION 2 3 TO ISSUE PERMITS FOR "BREW ON PREMISES" BUSINESSES. 4 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts: 5

Section 1. G.S. 18B-307 reads as rewritten:

"§ 18B-307. Manufacturing offenses.

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- Offenses. It shall be unlawful for any person, except as authorized by this (a) Chapter, to:
 - Sell or possess equipment or and ingredients intended for use in the (1) manufacture of any alcoholic beverage; beverage, except equipment provided under a Brew on Premises permit; or
 - Knowingly allow real or personal property owned or possessed by him (2) to be used by another person for the manufacture of any alcoholic beverage, except pursuant to a Brew on Premises permit.
- Unlawful Manufacturing. Except as provided in G.S. 18B- 306, it shall be unlawful for any person to manufacture any alcoholic beverage beverage, except pursuant to a Brew on Premises permit, without first obtaining the applicable ABC permit and revenue licenses.

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Second Offense of Manufacturing. – A second offense of unlawful
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     manufacturing of alcoholic beverage shall be a Class I felony."

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               Section 3. G.S. 18B-1001 reads as rewritten:
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     "§ 18B-1001. Kinds of ABC permits; places eligible.
         When the issuance of the permit is lawful in the jurisdiction in which the premises is
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located, the Commission may issue the following kinds of permits:

1 (1) On-Premises Malt Beverage Permit. – An on-premises malt beverage 2 permit authorizes the retail sale of malt beverages for consumption on 3 the premises and the retail sale of malt beverages in the manufacturer's original container for consumption off the premises. It also authorizes 4 5 the holder of the permit to ship malt beverages in closed containers to 6 individual purchasers inside and outside the State. The permit may be 7 issued for any of the following: 8 Restaurants: a. 9 b. Hotels: 10 Eating establishments; c. d. Food businesses: 11 12 Retail businesses: e. f. 13 Private clubs; 14 Convention centers; g. 15 h. Community theatres. 16 The permit may also be issued to certain breweries as authorized by 17 G.S. 18B-1104(7). 18 (2) Off-Premises Malt Beverage Permit. – An off-premises malt beverage 19 permit authorizes the retail sale of malt beverages in the manufacturer's 20 original container for consumption off the premises and it authorizes the 21 holder of the permit to ship malt beverages in closed containers to individual purchasers inside and outside the State. The permit may be 22 issued for any of the following: 23 Restaurants; 24 a. 25 b. Hotels: 26 c. Eating establishments; d. Food businesses: 27 28 Retail businesses. 29 On-Premises Unfortified Wine Permit. – An on-premises unfortified (3) 30 wine permit authorizes the retail sale of unfortified wine for consumption on the premises, either alone or mixed with other 31 beverages, and the retail sale of unfortified wine in the manufacturer's 32 original container for consumption off the premises. It also authorizes 33 the holder of the permit to ship unfortified wine in closed containers to 34 35 individual purchasers inside and outside the State. The permit may be issued for any of the following: 36 Restaurants: 37 a. 38 b. Hotels: 39 Eating establishments; c. Private clubs: 40 d. Convention centers: 41 e.

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Wineries. 1 h. 2 **(4)** Off-Premises Unfortified Wine Permit. – An off-premises unfortified 3 wine permit authorizes the retail sale of unfortified wine in the manufacturer's original container for consumption off the premises and 4 5 it authorizes the holder of the permit to ship unfortified wine in closed 6 containers to individual purchasers inside and outside the State. The 7 permit may be issued for retail businesses. The permit may also be 8 issued for a winery for sale of its own unfortified wine. 9 (5) On-Premises Fortified Wine Permit. – An on-premises fortified wine 10 permit authorizes the retail sale of fortified wine for consumption on the premises, either alone or mixed with other beverages, and the retail sale 11 12 of fortified wine in the manufacturer's original container for consumption off the premises. It also authorizes the holder of the permit 13 14 to ship fortified wine in closed containers to individual purchasers 15 inside and outside the State. The permit may be issued for any of the 16 following: 17 a. Restaurants; 18 b. Hotels; 19 Private clubs; c. d. Community theatres: 20 21 e. Wineries: Convention centers. 22 f. Off-Premises Fortified Wine Permit. – An off-premises fortified wine 23 (6) permit authorizes the retail sale of fortified wine in the manufacturer's 24 original container for consumption off the premises and it authorizes the 25 holder of the permit to ship fortified wine in closed containers to 26 individual purchasers inside and outside the State. The permit may be 27 issued for food businesses. The permit may also be issued for a winery 28 29 for sale of its own fortified wine. 30 Brown-Bagging Permit. – A brown-bagging permit authorizes each **(7)** individual patron of an establishment, with the permission of the 31 permittee, to bring up to eight liters of fortified wine or spirituous 32 liquor, or eight liters of the two combined, onto the premises and to 33 34 consume those alcoholic beverages on the premises. The permit may be 35 issued for any of the following: Restaurants; 36 a. Hotels: 37 b. Private clubs: 38 c. 39 d. Community theatres; Congressionally chartered veterans organizations. 40 (8) Special Occasion Permit. – A special occasion permit authorizes the 41 42 host of a reception, party or other special occasion, with the permission

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of the permittee, to bring fortified wine and spirituous liquor onto the

premises of the business and to serve the same to his guests. The permit 1 2 may be issued for any of the following: 3 Restaurants; a. Hotels; 4 b. 5 Eating establishments; C. 6 d. Private clubs: 7 Convention centers. 8 (9) Limited Special Occasion Permit. – A limited special occasion permit 9 authorizes the permittee to bring fortified wine and spirituous liquor 10 onto the premises of a business, with the permission of the owner of that property, and to serve those alcoholic beverages to the permittee's 11 12 guests at a reception, party, or other special occasion being held there. 13 The permit may be issued to any individual other than the owner or 14 possessor of the premises. An applicant for a limited special occasion 15 permit shall have the written permission of the owner or possessor of 16 the property on which the special occasion is to be held. 17 (10)Mixed Beverages Permit. – A mixed beverages permit authorizes the 18 retail sale of mixed beverages for consumption on the premises. The 19 permit also authorizes a mixed beverages permittee to obtain a purchase-transportation permit under G.S. 18B-403 and 18B-404, and to 20 21 use for culinary purposes spirituous liquor lawfully purchased for use in mixed beverages. The permit may be issued for any of the following: 22 Restaurants: 23 a. Hotels; 24 b. 25 c. Private clubs: Convention centers: 26 d. Community theatres; 27 e. f. Nonprofit organizations; and 28 29 Political organizations. 30 Culinary Permit. – A culinary permit authorizes a permittee to possess (11)up to 12 liters of either fortified wine or spirituous liquor, or 12 liters of 31 the two combined, in the kitchen of a business and to use those 32 alcoholic beverages for culinary purposes. The permit may be issued for 33 34 either of the following: 35 Restaurants; a. Hotels. 36 b. 37 Cooking schools. A culinary permit may also be issued to a catering service to allow the 38 39 possession of the amount of fortified wine and spirituous liquor stated 40 above at the business location of that service and at the cooking site. The permit shall also authorize the caterer to transport those alcoholic 41 42 beverages to and from the business location and the cooking site, and

use them in cooking.

1	(12)	Mixed Beverages Catering Permit. – A mixed beverages catering permit
2		authorizes a hotel or a restaurant that has a mixed beverages permit to
3		bring spirituous liquor onto the premises where the hotel or restaurant is
4		catering food for an event and to serve the liquor to guests at the event.
5	(13)	Guest Room Cabinet Permit. – A guest room cabinet permit authorizes a
6		hotel having a mixed beverages permit to sell to its room guests, from
7		securely locked cabinets, malt beverages, unfortified wine, fortified
8		wine, and spirituous liquor. A permittee shall designate and maintain at
9		least ten percent (10%) of the permittee's guest rooms as rooms that do
10		not have a guest room cabinet. A permittee may dispense alcoholic
11		beverages from a guest room cabinet only in accordance with written
12		policies and procedures filed with and approved by the Commission. A
13		permittee shall provide a reasonable number of vending machines,
14		coolers, or similar machines on premises for the sale of soft drinks to
15		hotel guests.
16		A guest room cabinet permit may be issued for any of the following:
17		a. A hotel located in a county subject to G.S. 18B-600(f).
18		b. A hotel located in a county that has a population in excess of
19		150,000 by the last federal census.
20	<u>(14)</u>	Brew on Premises Permit. A permit may be issued to a business, in any
21		county with a population of 500,000 or more, where retail clients
22		purchase ingredients and rent the equipment, time, and space to brew
23		malt beverages in amounts allowed for personal use pursuant to G.S.
24		<u>18B-300.</u>
25		The retail client shall:
26		<u>a.</u> <u>Select a recipe and kettle;</u>
27		<u>b.</u> Weigh out the proper ingredients and add them to the kettle;
28		 <u>Weigh out the proper ingredients and add them to the kettle;</u> <u>Transfer the wort to the fermenter;</u> <u>Add the yeast;</u>
29		
30		e. Place the ingredients in a fermentation room; and
31		<u>f.</u> <u>Filter, carbonate, and bottle the malt beverage.</u>
32		The permittee may:
33		a. Assist the retail client in all steps except adding the yeast; and
34		<u>b.</u> <u>May transfer the ingredients from the fermentation room to the</u>
35		<u>cold room.</u> "
36	Section	on 4. This act is effective when it becomes law.
