The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts: Section 1. G.S. 160A-20(h) reads as rewritten: As used in this section, the term 'unit of local government' means any of the "(h) following: (1) A county. A city. (2) A water and sewer authority created under Article 1 of Chapter 162A of (3) the General Statutes.

An airport authority whose situs is entirely within a county that has (i) a

population of over 120,000 according to the most recent federal

An airport authority in a county in which there are two incorporated municipalities with a population of more than 65,000 according to the most recent federal decennial census.

13	(8) A consolidated city-county, as defined by G.S. 160B-2(1)."
14	Section 2. This act is effective when it becomes law.
