Short Title: Auctioneer Education Requirements.

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED 1 2 AN ACT TO AMEND THE EDUCATIONAL REQUIREMENTS FOR 3 AUCTIONEERS, APPRENTICE AUCTIONEERS, AND PRINCIPALS IN AN 4 AUCTION FIRM. 5 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts: Section 1. G.S. 85B-3 reads as rewritten: 6 7 "§ 85B-3. Auctioneers Commission. 8 There shall be a five-member North Carolina Auctioneers Commission having (a) 9 the powers and responsibilities set out in this Chapter. The Governor shall appoint the members of the Commission, at least three of whom, and their successors, shall be from 10 nominations submitted by the Auctioneers Association of North Carolina. The 11 Auctioneers Association shall submit, within 45 days of when the vacancy occurs, at least 12 three names for each position for which it is entitled to make a nomination. Of the initial 13 five members of the Commission one shall be appointed for a one-year term, two shall be 14 appointed for two-year terms and two for three-year terms; thereafter, each new member 15 shall be appointed for a term of three years. Any vacancy shall be filled for the remainder 16 of the unexpired term only. Each member shall continue in office until his successor is 17 appointed and qualified. No member shall serve more than two complete consecutive 18 19 terms.

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1	(b) At least three members of the Commission shall be experienced auctioneers				
2	who are licensed under this Chapter. One member shall be a person who shall represent				
3	the public at large and shall not be licensed under this Chapter.				
4	(c) The Commission shall employ an executive director and other employees as				
5	needed to carry out the duties of this Chapter. All employees shall serve at the pleasure of				
6	the Commission.				
7	(d) Any action that may be taken by the Commission may be taken by vote of any				
8	three of its members.				
9	(e) The members of the Commission shall elect from among themselves a				
10	chairman to serve a one-year term. No person shall serve more than two consecutive				
11	terms as chairman.				
12	(f) The Commission shall (i) receive and act upon applications for auctioneer				
13	licenses, issue and suspend-licenses; (ii) issue, suspend, and revoke licenses, licenses; (iii)				
14	set reasonable fines for violating the provisions of this Chapter; (iv) adopt rules and				
15	regulations for auctioneers and auctions that are consistent with the provisions of this				
16	Chapter and the General Statutes, Statutes; and (v) issue declaratory rulings. The				
17	Commission may make and enforce reasonable rules and take other actions necessary to				
18	administer and enforce the provisions of this Chapter.				
19	(g) Members of the Commission shall receive the compensation set for members				
20	of occupational licensing boards by G.S. 93B-5."				
21	Section 2. G.S. 85B-4 reads as rewritten:				
22	"§ 85B-4. Licenses required.				
23	(a) No person who is not exempt under G.S. 85B-2, shall sell, or offer to sell,				
24	goods or real estate at auction in this State or perform any act for which an auction firm				
25	license is required unless the person holds a currently valid license issued under this				
26	Chapter.				
27	(b) No person shall be licensed as an apprentice auctioneer, auctioneer, or receive				
28	an auction firm license if the person:

40	(c) Each applicant for an apprentice auctioneer license shall submit a written				
41	application in a form approved by the Commission and containing at least two statements				
42	by residents of the community in which the applicant resides attesting to the applicant's				
43	good moral character.				

1 (c1) Each apprentice auctioneer application and license shall name a licensed 2 auctioneer to serve as the supervisor of the apprentice. No apprentice auctioneer may 3 enter into an agreement to conduct an auction, or conduct an auction, without the express 4 approval of his supervisor. The supervisor shall review all contracts before approving 5 them and shall regularly review the records his apprentice is required to maintain under 6 G.S. 85B-7 to see that they are accurate and current, and shall perform such other 7 supervisory duties as may be required by the Commission.

8 No person shall be licensed as an auctioneer unless the person has held an (d)9 apprentice auctioneer license and served as an apprentice auctioneer for the two preceding years, accumulated sufficient knowledge and experience in such areas of the 10 auctioneer profession as the Commission may deem appropriate, and has taken an 11 12 examination approved by the Commission and performed on it to the satisfaction of the Commission. The examination shall test the applicant's understanding of the law relating 13 14 to auctioneers and auctions, ethical practices for auctioneers, the mathematics applicable 15 to the auctioneer business, and such other matters relating to auctions as the Commission considers appropriate. The examination shall be given at least twice each year in Raleigh, 16 17 and at other times and places the Commission designates, but no person shall be allowed 18 to take the examination within six months after having failed it a second time.

Any person who has been in the auctioneer business in this State for at least two years 19 20 prior to the effective date of this act [July 1, 1973], and who makes proper application to the Commission within one year after July 1, 1973, may be licensed as an auctioneer 21 without holding an apprentice license and serving as an apprentice of two years, and 22 without taking the examination required by this subsection. Any person who has 23 24 successfully completed the equivalent of at least 80 hours of classroom instruction in a course in auctioneering at an institution approved by the Commission-whose curriculum 25 and instructors meet the qualifications approved or established by the Commission may 26 be licensed as an auctioneer without holding an apprentice license and serving as an 27 apprentice for two years, but must shall take the examination required by this subsection 28 29 and perform on it to the satisfaction of the Commission.

Each applicant for an auctioneer license shall submit a written application in a form 30 approved by the Commission. If the applicant has been previously licensed as an 31 apprentice auctioneer, the application shall contain an evaluation by the applicant's 32 33 supervisor of the applicant's performance as an apprentice auctioneer and the applicant's performance in specific areas as required by the Commission. If the applicant is 34 35 exempted from apprenticeship after completion of the equivalent of at least 80 hours of classroom instruction in auctioneering, the application shall contain a transcript of the 36 applicant's course work in auctioneering. Each application shall be accompanied by 37 38 statements of at least two residents of the community in which the applicant resides 39 attesting to the applicant's good moral character. The Commission may require verification of any information included in an application for an auctioneer license and 40 may request other information or verification of information provided to determine 41 42 whether the applicant possesses the good moral character or other qualifications for 43 licensure.

1 (e) Each license issued under this Chapter shall be valid from July 1 of the year 2 issued, or from the date issued, whichever is later, to the following June 30 unless sooner 3 revoked or suspended pursuant to this Chapter or a rule of the Commission. A license 4 may be renewed for one year at a time, except an apprentice auctioneer license may not 5 be renewed for more than three times. No examination shall be required for renewal of an 6 auctioneer license if the application for renewal is made within 24 months of the 7 expiration of the previous license.

8 (e1) The Commission may require licensees to complete annually not more than six 9 hours of Commission-approved continuing education courses prior to license renewal. 10 The Commission may impose different continuing education requirements, including no 11 such requirements, upon the classes of licensees under this Chapter. The Commission 12 may waive any or all continuing education requirements in cases of hardship, disability, 13 or illness, or under other circumstances as the Commission deems appropriate.

14 (f) No person shall be issued an auctioneer or apprentice auctioneer license until 15 the person has made the contribution to the Fund as required by G.S. 85B-4.1.

16 (g) An auction firm must be licensed by the Board even though no owner or 17 officer of the firm acts as an auctioneer. To be licensed an auction firm must make the 18 contribution to the Fund as required by G.S. 85B-4.1 and must pay the proper fees as set 19 out in G.S. 85B-6. Auction firms are covered by the provisions of G.S. 85B-8.

An auction firm license issued by the Commission is restricted to the persons named in the license and does not inure to the benefit of any other person. Where a license is issued to an auction firm, authority to transact business under the license is limited to the person or persons designated in the application and named in the license.

24 The designated person or persons, prior to being licensed, shall be required to take a written examination, approved by the Commission, and demonstrate to the satisfaction of 25 the Commission a thorough understanding of the law relating to the conduct of the 26 27 auction business and other matters the Commission deems appropriate. An individual who is licensed as an auctioneer and who is the designated person applying for an auction 28 29 firm license is not required to take the auction firm examination. Licensed real estate 30 brokers and real estate firms may be exempt from the auction firm examination provided they employ or associate themselves with a licensed auctioneer to handle those aspects of 31 32 the transactions peculiar to the auctioneer profession. Any person or entity, on the 33 effective date of this Chapter, duly licensed as an auction firm in good standing is not required to take any examination in order to maintain or to renew an auction firm license 34 35 provided that the license does not otherwise expire or lapse and is not suspended or 36 revoked by the Commission.

- (h) The Commission shall publish at least once a year a list of names and
   addresses of all persons, sole proprietorships, partnerships and corporations holding valid
   apprentice auctioneer, auctioneer, or auction firm licenses.
- 40 (i) The Commission may investigate as it deems necessary the ethical background 41 of any applicant for licensure under this Chapter."

Section 3. G.S. 85B-4.1 reads as rewritten:

43 "§ 85B-4.1. Auctioneer Recovery Fund.

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1	(a) In addition to license fees, upon application for a license or renewal of a				
2	license, the Commission may charge the applicant or licensee up to fifty dollars (\$50.00)				
3	per year to be included in the Fund.				
4	(b) The Commission shall maintain at least <u>one-two</u> hundred thousand dollars				
5	(\$100,000)-(\$200,000) in the Fund for use as provided in this Chapter. The Fund may be				
6	invested by the State Treasurer in interest bearing accounts, and any interest accrued shall				
7	be added to the Fund. Sufficient liquidity shall be maintained to insure that funds will be				
8	available to satisfy claims processed through the Board. The Fund may be disbursed by a				
9	warrant drawn against the State Treasurer or by other method at the discretion of the				
10	State Treasurer.				
11	(c) The Commission, in its discretion, may use contents of the Fund in excess of				
12	one-two hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000)-(\$200,000) for the following purposes:				
13	(1) To promote education and research in the auctioneer profession, in order				
14	to benefit persons licensed under this Chapter and to improve the				
15	efficiency of the profession; profession.				
16	(2) To underwrite educational seminars, training centers, and other forms of				
17	educational projects for the use and benefit of licensees; licensees.				
18	(3) To sponsor, contract for, or underwrite education and research projects				
19	in order to advance the auctioneer profession in North Carolina; and				
20	North Carolina.				
21	(4) To cooperate with associations of auctioneers, or other groups, in order				
22	to promote the enlightenment and advancement of the auctioneer				
23	profession in North Carolina."

10 (f) A person whose license has been denied, suspended, or revoked may not apply 11 in that person's name or in any other manner within the period during which the order of 12 denial, suspension, or revocation is in effect, and no firm, partnership, or corporation in 13 which any person has a substantial interest or exercises management responsibility or 14 control may be licensed during the period."

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Section 6. G.S. 85B-9 reads as rewritten:

#### 16 "§ 85B-9. Penalties and enforcement.

(a) Any person, corporation or association of persons violating the provisions of
 G.S. 85B-4(a) shall be guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor. <u>The Attorney General of North</u>
 <u>Carolina, or the Attorney General's designee, shall have concurrent jurisdiction with the</u>
 <u>district attorneys of this State to prosecute violations of this Chapter.</u>

(b) The Commission may in its own name seek injunctive relief in the General
Court of Justice to restrain any violation or anticipated violation of the provisions of G.S.
85B-4(a) or any violation of this Chapter.

(c) The Commission shall be entitled to the services of the Attorney General of
 North Carolina in enforcing the provisions of this Chapter or may employ an attorney to
 assist and represent it in enforcement of specific matters."

27 Section 7. Article 4 of Chapter 114 of the General Statutes is amended by 28 adding a new section to read:

### 29 "§ 114-19.8. Criminal record checks of applicants for auctioneer license.

The Department of Justice may provide to the North Carolina Auctioneers 30 Commission from the State and National Repositories of Criminal Histories the criminal 31 history of any applicant for an auctioneer's license under Chapter 85B of the General 32 Statutes. Along with the request, the Commission shall provide to the Department of 33 Justice the fingerprints of the applicant, a form signed by the applicant consenting to the 34 criminal record check and the use of fingerprints and other identifying information 35 required by the State or National Repositories, and any additional information required 36 by the Department of Justice. The applicant's fingerprints shall be forwarded to the State 37 Bureau of Investigation for a check of the State's criminal history record file, and the 38 State Bureau of Investigation shall forward a set of fingerprints to the Federal Bureau of 39 Investigation for a national criminal history record check. The Commission shall keep all 40 information obtained pursuant to this section privileged. The Department of Justice shall 41 charge a reasonable fee for conducting the check of the national criminal history records 42 authorized by this section." 43

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Section 8. This act is effective when it becomes law.
