| EFFECTIVE DATE: This act is effective when it becomes law. | | | | | |

BILL SUMMARY: The bill authorizes the State Board of Barber Examiners to assess civil penalties, changes the number of instructors per enrolled students in barber colleges and schools, requires a barber to be on premises of barbershop at all times while an apprentice is working, and changes the name of executive secretary to executive director.

ASSUMPTIONS AND METHODOLOGY:

Section 5 of the bill allows the Board to assess a civil penalty on a registered barber whose certificate of registration has expired for a period greater than six months. Section 10 of the bill allows the Board to assess a civil penalty not in excess of \$500 per offense for Chapter 86A violations. The proceeds of these penalties go to the Civil Penalty and Forfeiture Fund, not to the Board. Since this power is discretionary, no estimate can be made at this time.
