11	SEC	TION 1. Commission Established; Membership. – The Legislative
12	Commission on Global Climate Change is hereby established. The Commission shall

The Director of the Carolina Environmental Program at the University 22 (18)23 of North Carolina at Chapel Hill or the Director's Designee. 24 **SECTION 2.** Cochairs. – The Commission shall have two Cochairs, one 25 senator designated by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate and one representative designated by the Speaker of the House of Representatives from among their respective 26 27 appointees. The Commission shall meet upon the call of the Cochairs. 28 **SECTION 3.** Quorum. – A quorum of the Commission shall consist of 17 29 members. 30 **SECTION 4.** Vacancies. – Any vacancy on the Commission shall be filled as provided in Section 1 of this act or by the original appointing authority as 31 32 appropriate. 33 **SECTION 5.** Purpose and Duties. – The Commission shall have the 34 following purposes and duties: 35 The Commission shall conduct an in-depth examination of issues (1) related to global climate change. This examination shall include all of 36 the following: 37 38 A review of current scientific literature on the possible natural 39 and anthropogenic causes of global climate change. A review of actions taken by the federal government and by 40 b. other states to address global warming. 41 42 An examination of the emissions of greenhouse gases from c. within the State and the extent to which reductions in the 43

emissions of these gases in the State, region, nation, and 1 2 worldwide could be expected to affect global climate change. 3 d. An evaluation of the economic opportunities for the State that may result from international, national, and State action to 4 5 address global climate change and the emerging carbon market. 6 The potential impacts of global climate change on the citizens, e. 7 natural resources, and economy of the State, including 8 agriculture, travel and tourism, recreation, coastal real estate, 9 insurance, and other economic sectors. 10 f. The costs of any action taken by the State to address global climate change on individuals, individual households, local 11 12 governments, businesses, educational institutions, agricultural 13 operations, the State government, and other institutions and 14 economic sectors. 15 The benefits of any action taken by or within the State or other g. 16 states and at the national or international levels to address 17 global climate change on individuals, individual households, 18 governments, businesses, educational institutions. 19 agricultural operations, the State government, and other 20 institutions and economic sectors. 21 (2) If, in the course of its examination, the Commission determines that it would be appropriate and desirable for the State to establish a global 22 warming pollutant reduction goal, the Commission may develop a 23 24 recommended global warming pollutant reduction goal for the State. In conducting its examination of global climate change, the 25 (3) Commission shall consider and integrate the findings 26 27 recommendations of the study of issues related to the development and implementation of standards and plans to control emissions of carbon 28 29 dioxide required by Section 13 of S.L. 2002-4. 30 Based on its examination of global climate change, the Commission **(4)** shall develop findings and recommendations, including any legislative 31 32 proposals it determines to be appropriate, for consideration by the 33 General Assembly. **SECTION 6.** Additional Duties. – The Commission may work cooperatively 34

with other state and national governments to organize a forum on global climate change, including its causes, impacts, challenges, and opportunities in the southeastern United States.

SECTION 7. Expenses of Members. – Members of the Commission shall receive per diem, subsistence, and travel allowances in accordance with G.S. 120-3.1, 138-5, or 138-6, as appropriate.

SECTION 8. Staff. – Upon the prior approval of the Legislative Services Commission, the Legislative Services Officer shall assign professional staff to the Commission to aid in its work.

SECTION 9. Consultants. – The Commission may hire consultants to assist with the study. Before expending any funds for a consultant, the Commission shall report to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations on the consultant selected, the work products to be provided by the consultant, and the cost of the contract, including an itemization of the cost components.

6 7 **SECTION 10.** Report. – The Commission shall report its findings and recommendations to the General Assembly and the Environmental Review Commission on or before 1 November 2006, at which time the Commission shall terminate.

SECTION 11. Funding. – From funds appropriated to the General Assembly, the Legislative Services Commission shall allocate funds for the purpose of conducting the study provided for in this act.

SECTION 12. Effective Date. – This act is effective when it becomes law.
