1 2	charge a fee to offset the cost incurred by it to conduct a criminal record check under this section. The fee shall not exceed the actual cost of locating, editing, researching, and retrieving		
3	the information. The Department of Justice shall send a copy of the results of the criminal		
4	record checks directly to the Utilities Commission Chief Clerk. In those instances where the		
5	quality characteristic of an applicant's or current holder's fingerprints is determined to be too		
6	low or otherwise inadequate for processing by the FBI, the applicant or current holder shall		
7	comply with the Commission's criminal history records check requirement pursuant to the		
8	Commission's alternate name-based records check procedure.		
9	(c) If the applicant's or current holder's verified criminal history record check reveals		
10	one or more convictions, the convictions shall not automatically constitute cause for denying an		
11	application or revoking a certificate. However, all of the following factors shall be considered		
12	by the Commission in determining whether the application should be denied or the certificate		
13	<u>revoked:</u>		
14	(1) The level and seriousness of the crime.		
15	(2) The date of the crime.

22	(d) The Commission may deny an application or revoke a certificate if the applicant or		
23 24	current holder refuses to consent to a criminal history record check or use of fingerprints or		
25	other identifying information required by the State or National Repositories of Criminal		
26	Histories."		
27	SECTION 2. This act is effective when it becomes law and applies to all persons		
28	holding a current certificate of exemption or a certificate of public convenience and necessity		
29	on or after that date and to all applications for a certification of exemption or a certificate of		
30	public convenience and necessity received by the Commission on or after that date.
