1	A BILL TO BE ENTITLED			
2	AN ACT TO CREATE OPPORTUNITY SCHOLARSHIP GRANTS.			
3	Whereas, the State has a constitutional obligation to fund the delivery of a sound			
4	basic education to children; and			
5	Whereas, children of families with limited financial resources need expanded			
6	educational opportunities; and			
7	Whereas, a solid educational foundation can help reduce the socioeconomic			
8	achievement gap; and			
9	Whereas, by creating additional educational environments that enable each child to			
10	learn, the State can improve the quality of the education it funds; Now, therefore,			
11	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:			
12	SECTION 1.(a) The State Education Assistance Authority (Authority) shall award			
13	scholarship grants to eligible students for the 2013-2014 school year to attend nonpublic			
14	schools that meet the requirements of Article 39 of Chapter 115C, as identified by the Division			
15	of Nonpublic Education, Department of Administration. The Authority shall make applications			
16	available no later than August 1, 2013, and shall begin awarding grants no later than August 15,			
17	2013. Information about scholarship grants and the application process shall be made available			
18 19	on the Authority's Web site. The Division of Nonpublic Education, Department of Administration shall make evaluable to the Authority e list of all perpublic schools experime			
19 20	Administration, shall make available to the Authority a list of all nonpublic schools operating in the State that meet the requirements of Part 1 or Part 2 of Article 39 of Chapter 115C of the			
20	General Statutes no later than August 1, 2013.			
21	SECTION 1.(b) For the 2013-2014 school year, to be eligible to receive a			
23	scholarship grant, a student shall meet both of the following criteria:			
24	(1) Reside in a household with an income level not in excess of the amount			
25	required for the student to qualify for the federal free or reduced price lunch			
26	program.			
27	(2) Be a full-time student who has not yet received a high school diploma and			
28	was assigned to and attending a public school pursuant to G.S. 115C-366			
29	during the 2013 spring semester.			
30	SECTION 1.(c) Scholarship grants for 2013-2014 shall be for amounts of up to			
31	four thousand two hundred dollars (\$4,200) for required tuition and fees for the nonpublic			
32	school the eligible child will attend. Tuition and fees for a nonpublic school may include tuition			
33	and fees for books, transportation, equipment, or other items required by the nonpublic school.			
34	No scholarship grant shall exceed the required tuition and fees for the nonpublic school the			
35	eligible student will attend.

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1	The Authority shall remit, at least two times each school year, scholarship grant funds			
2	awarded to eligible students to the nonpublic school for endorsement by at least one of the			
3	student's parents or guardians. The parent or guardian shall restrictively endorse the scholarship			
4	grant funds awarded to the eligible student to the nonpublic school for deposit into the account			
5	of the nonpublic school. The parent or guardian shall not designate any entity or individual			
6	associated with the nonpublic school as the parent's attorney-in-fact to endorse the scholarship			
7	grant funds but shall endorse the scholarship grant funds in person at the site of the nonpublic			
8	school. A parent's or guardian's failure to comply with this section shall result in forfeit of the			
9	scholarship grant. A scholarship grant forfeited for failure to comply with this section shall be			
10	returned to the Authority to be awarded to another student.			
11	" <u>§ 115C-562.7. Authority reporting requirements.</u>			
12	(a) The Authority shall report to the Department of Public Instruction annually, no later			
13	than August 1, the number of students who have received scholarship grants for the current			
14	school year and who were enrolled the prior semester in a local school administrative unit or			
15	charter school by the previously attended local school administrative unit or charter school. The			
16	Department of Public Instruction shall adjust the allotments of local school administrative units			
17	and charter schools based on the number of students awarded a scholarship grant who attended			
18	a local school administrative unit or charter school during the prior semester. The amount of the			
19	adjustment shall equal the average per pupil allocation for average daily membership from the			
20	local school administrative unit or charter school.			
21	(b) The Authority shall report annually, no later than March 1, to the Joint Legislative			
22	Education Oversight Committee on the following:			
23	(1) Total number, grade level, race, ethnicity, and sex of eligible students			
24	receiving scholarship grants.			
25	(2) Total amount of scholarship grant funding awarded.			
26	(3) Number of students previously enrolled in local school administrative units			
27	or charter schools in the prior semester, by the previously attended local			
28	school administrative unit or charter school.			
29	(4) <u>Nonpublic schools in which scholarship grant recipients are enrolled</u> ,			
30	including numbers of scholarship grant students at each nonpublic school.			
31	(5) <u>Nonpublic schools deemed ineligible to receive scholarships.</u>			
32	(c) <u>The Authority shall report annually, no later than December 1, to the Department of</u>			
33	Public Instruction and the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee on the learning			
34	gains or losses of students receiving scholarship grants. This report shall be conducted by an			
35	independent research organization to be selected by the Authority, which may be a public or			
36	private entity or university. The independent research organization shall report to the Authority			
37	on the learning gains of participating students on a statewide basis and shall compare, to the			
38 39	extent possible, the learning gains or losses of eligible students by nonpublic school to the statewide learning gains or losses of public school students with similar socioeconomic
