A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
AN ACT TO CLARIFY THAT THE EXEMPTION FROM ZONING FOR A BONA FIDE FARM INCLUDES GRAIN STORAGE FACILITIES.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

**SECTION 1.** G.S. 153A-340(b) reads as rewritten:

## "§ 153A-340. Grant of power.

... (b)

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- (1) These regulations may affect property used for bona fide farm purposes only as provided in subdivision (3) of this subsection. This subsection does not limit regulation under this Part with respect to the use of farm property for nonfarm purposes.
- Except as provided in G.S. 106-743.4 for farms that are subject to a (2) conservation agreement under G.S. 106-743.2, bona fide farm purposes include the production and activities relating or incidental to the production of crops, grains, fruits, vegetables, ornamental and flowering plants, dairy, livestock, poultry, and all other forms of agriculture agriculture, as defined in G.S. 106-581.1.G.S. 106-581.1, grown or cultivated on the affected farm property, as well as on land owned or leased to or from others by the farm owner, including other tracts of land in the State and land owned or leased in other states. For purposes of this subdivision, the production of a nonfarm product that the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services recognizes as a "Goodness Grows in North Carolina" product that is produced on a farm subject to a conservation agreement under G.S. 106-743.2 is a bona fide farm purpose. For purposes of determining whether a property is being used for bona fide farm purposes, any of the following shall constitute sufficient evidence that the property is being used for bona fide farm purposes:
  - a. A farm sales tax exemption certificate issued by the Department of Revenue.
  - b. A copy of the property tax listing showing that the property is eligible for participation in the present use value program pursuant to G.S. 105-277.3.
  - c. A copy of the farm owner's or operator's Schedule F from the owner's or operator's most recent federal income tax return.
  - d. A forest management plan.

Agriculture defined. 12 For purposes of this Article, the terms "agriculture", "agricultural", and "farming" refer to 13 all of the following: 14 (1) The cultivation of soil for production and harvesting of crops, including but 15 not limited to fruits, vegetables, sod, flowers and ornamental plants. 16 The planting and production of trees and timber. (2) 17 (3) Dairying and the raising, management, care, and training of livestock, 18 including horses, bees, poultry, and other animals for individual and public 19 use, consumption, and marketing. 20 (4) Aquaculture as defined in G.S. 106-758. 21 (5) The operation, management, conservation, improvement, and maintenance 22 of a farm and the structures and buildings on the farm, including building 23 and structure repair, replacement, expansion, and construction incident to the 24 farming operation. 25 When performed on the farm, "agriculture", "agricultural", and "farming" (6) 26 also include the marketing and selling of agricultural products, agritourism, 27 the storage and use of materials for agricultural purposes, packing, treating, 28 processing, sorting, storage, and other activities performed to add value to 29 crops, livestock, and agricultural items produced on the farm, and similar 30 activities incident to the operation of a farm. 31 A public or private grain warehouse or warehouse operation, where grain is (7) 32 held 10 days or longer and includes, but is not limited to, all buildings, 33 elevators, equipment, and warehouses consisting of one or more warehouse
