### A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

2 AN ACT TO EXTEND THE CABARRUS COUNTY WORK OVER WELFARE 3 PROGRAM. 4 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts: SECTION 1. S.L. 1998-106 reads as rewritten: 5 6 "Section 1. Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the Department of Health and Human Services shall designate continue designation of Cabarrus County as a pilot 7 8 county for the purpose of conducting a demonstration Workfare Program-welfare reform program for certain Work First and Food Stamp recipients. Immediately upon 9 the ratification of this act, the Department shall seek ensure that all federal waivers 10 necessary to allow this demonstration program.program to continue are obtained. To the 11 extent that this act or the program established pursuant to it conflicts with any State law, 12 the program supersedes that law. 13 Sec. 2. The Cabarrus County demonstration Workfare-Work Over Welfare Program 14 for certain Work First and Food Stamp recipients shall: 15 Provide job opportunities to all able-bodied Work First and Food 16 (1)Stamp recipients who are required to participate in the Work First 17 18 employment program. Create job opportunities in the public, the private, nonprofit, and the 19 (2)private, for-profit sector, primarily in the human services areas by 20 allowing Cabarrus County to use grant diversions, consisting of the 21 Work First benefits and the cash value of Food Stamps that would be 22 paid to otherwise eligible recipients to match employer funds, to 23 subsidize the employment of these recipients. Human service area jobs 24 will meet such socially necessary needs as day care work, nursing 25 home aide work, and in-home aide work; 26

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1	(3)	Allow wages paid to these recipients, which contain grant-diverted
2	(0)	funds, to be exempt from income for purposes of determining
3		eligibility for assistance;
4	(4)	Structure payment of wages to these recipients such that they will be
5		considered income, in order to make recipients eligible for the federal
6		earned income tax credit;
7	(5)	Create work experience opportunities in the private sector more
8	(-)	realistically to reflect the world of work;
9	(6)	Require these recipients to participate in the development of an
10	(-)	opportunity contract, agreement outlining the responsibilities of the
11		recipient and agency, as well as the incentives for compliance and the
12		sanctions for noncompliance;
13	(7)	Require all these recipients who participate in the program to pursue
14	(.)	and accept employment, full or part time, subsidized or unsubsidized,
15		as a condition for continued eligibility for Work First and Food Stamp
16		assistance;
17	(8)	Require job search training of all participants;
18	(9)	Require monitored job search of all participants until employment is
19		found or until other work activities of up to 40 hours per week are in
20		place;
21	<del>(10)</del>	Provide child care by allowing Cabarrus County to use grant
22		diversions, consisting of the child day care subsidies that would be
23		paid to otherwise eligible recipients, and transportation as required;
24	(11)	Create a positive work incentive by providing wage incentives to
25		participants who are in compliance with the program, equal to the first
26		thirty dollars (\$30.00) and one third of the remainder of monthly gross
27		income for a period of up to two years; program by utilizing the job
28		bonus as outlined in the Work First Policy Manual;
29	(12)	Provide enhanced Food Stamp benefits after participants are employed
30		and are in program compliance by using the thirty dollar (\$30.00) and
31		one third of the remainder wage incentive as an income exemption; job
32		bonus as outlined in the Work First Policy Manual;
33	(13)	Provide (i) a pay for performance system that withholds the entire
34		Work First benefits for the household for the month following any
35		month in which it fails to comply with Work First participation
36		requirements and restores these benefits for the month following any
37		month in which it successfully complies with Work First participation
38		requirements, and, to ensure that children in sanctioned households are
39		not harmed, (ii) social worker monitoring and the use of direct vendor
40		payments or assistance from other community resources for rent,
41		utilities, or other basic needs of children, as necessary, during the
42		period in which the household is sanctioned; for a system in which the
43		Work First cash assistance case is terminated following the first month
44		of noncompliance, with restoration of assistance after the client agrees

2		that children in terminated households are not harmed, provide social
3		worker monitoring and the use of direct vendor payments or assistance
4		from other community resources for rent, utilities, or other basic needs

7	(14)	Provide automatic Medicaid coverage for children and pregnant adults
8		of sanctioned terminated families by transferring the children
9		administratively to the Medicaid for Indigent Children (MIC) Program
10		and by transferring the pregnant adults administratively to the
11		Medicaid for Pregnant Women (MPW) Program.Program;
12	<u>(15)</u>	Count income from children in the home receiving SSI in the same
13		manner as social security income is counted to assure that all families
14		are treated fairly;
15	(16)	Require that a recipient who voluntarily terminates employment
16		without good cause be ineligible for Work First until the individual
17		returns to work, provided work opportunities are available. Provide
18		employment services for 30 days to assist the individual in obtaining
19		employment;
20	(17)	Require applicants for Work First to meet with child support staff
21		within 10 days of application. Failure or refusal to pursue child support
22		without good cause is grounds for denial of benefits;
23	(18)	Provide that a recipient who is convicted of felony fraudulent
24		misrepresentation under G.S. 108A-39(b) shall be permanently
25		disqualified from participation in the Work First program;
26	<u>(19)</u>	Provide that an applicant may be eligible for a one-time Work First
27		diversion payment in an amount not exceeding one thousand two
28		hundred dollars (\$1,200). Applicants receiving the diversion payment
29		shall not be eligible for ongoing Work First benefits for a period of
30		three months from the date of receipt of the diversion payment.
31		Individuals receiving a diversion payment must attend budgetary
32		counseling and may be required to have a protective payee for the
33		diversion payment;
34	(20)	Provide that the period of exemption from participation in employment
35		services for a parent of a newborn child is three months. If a recipient
36		returns to work within six weeks of childbirth, the recipient may
37		reclaim the remainder of the three-month exemption if the recipient
38		chooses not to continue working during the initial six-week period;
39	(21)	In ongoing Work First cases, require family reassessment of service
40		needs when the family circumstance changes due to an able-bodied,
41		financially responsible adult moving into the home. Family
42		reassessment may result in benefit diversion, change in services, or
43		termination from Work First program participation.

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Sec. 3. This act shall be funded by Cabarrus County using the <u>available</u> grant
 diversions and administrative <u>transfers</u>, transfers prescribed in Section 2 of this act,
 together with federal and State administrative funding allocated to Cabarrus County for
 the public assistance programs.
 Sec. 4. The Department of Health and Human Services shall evaluate the Cabarrus
 County Demonstration Project and report to the General Assembly and to the Joint
 Logislative Public Assistance Commission on ar before Santamber 1, 1008, 2002

Legislative Public Assistance Commission on or before September 1, <u>1998.2002.</u>
Sec. 5. This act becomes effective July 1, 1995 and shall expire on July 1,

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**SECTION 2.** This act is effective when it becomes law.
