A BILL TO BE ENTITLED 1 2 AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR AUTOMATIC ADJUSTMENT OF THE STATE'S 3 MINIMUM WAGE BASED ON INCREASES IN THE CONSUMER PRICE 4 INDEX. 5 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts: 6 **SECTION 1.** G.S. 95-25.3 reads as rewritten: 7 "§ 95-25.3. Minimum wage. 8 Every Subject to the provisions of subsection (a1) of this section, every (a) 9 employer shall pay to each employee who in any workweek performs any work, wages 10 of at least six dollars and fifteen cents (\$6.15) per hour or the minimum wage set forth in paragraph 1 of section 6(a) of the Fair Labor Standards Act, 29 U.S.C. 206(a)(1), as 11 12 that wage may change from time to time, whichever is higher, except as otherwise 13 provided in this section. 14 (a1) The minimum wage required by subsection (a) of this section shall be increased on January 1, 2008, and on January 1 of successive years by the increase in 15 16 the cost of living. The increase in the cost of living shall be measured by the percentage increase of the consumer price index (all urban consumers, U.S. city average for all 17 18 items), CPI-U, or its successor index, as calculated by the U.S. Department of Labor for 19 the 12 months preceding the previous September 1. The Commissioner shall calculate the indexed minimum wage rate. The indexed minimum wage rate shall be calculated to 20 21 the nearest cent (\$0.01). 22 (b) In order to prevent curtailment of opportunities for employment, the wage 23 rate for full-time students, learners, apprentices, and messengers, as defined under the 24 Fair Labor Standards Act, shall be ninety percent (90%) of the rate in effect under 25 subsection (a) above, rounded to the lowest nickel. The Commissioner, in order to prevent curtailment of opportunities for 26 (c) 27 employment, may, by regulation, establish a wage rate less than the wage rate in effect

28 under section (a) which may apply to persons whose earning or productive capacity is

1 impaired by age or physical or mental deficiency or injury, as such persons are defined2 under the Fair Labor Standards Act.

3 The Commissioner, in order to prevent curtailment of opportunities for (d) 4 employment of the economically disadvantaged and the unemployed, may, by 5 regulation, establish a wage rate not less than eighty-five percent (85%) of the otherwise 6 applicable wage rate in effect under subsection (a) which shall apply to all persons (i) 7 who have been unemployed for at least 15 weeks and who are economically 8 disadvantaged, or (ii) who are, or whose families are, receiving Work First Family 9 Assistance or who are receiving supplemental security benefits under Title XVI of the 10 Social Security Act.

Pursuant to regulations issued by the Commissioner, certificates establishing eligibility for such subminimum wage shall be issued by the Employment Security Commission.

14 The regulation issued by the Commissioner shall not permit employment at the 15 subminimum rate for a period in excess of 52 weeks.

16 (e) The Commissioner, in order to prevent curtailment of opportunities for 17 employment, and to not adversely affect the viability of seasonal establishments, may, 18 by regulation, establish a wage rate not less than eighty-five percent (85%) of the 19 otherwise applicable wage rate in effect under subsection (a) which shall apply to any 20 employee employed by an establishment which is a seasonal amusement or recreational 21 establishment, or a seasonal food service establishment.

22 (f) Tips earned by a tipped employee may be counted as wages only up to the 23 amount permitted in section 3(m) of the Fair Labor Standards Act, 29 U.S.C. 203(m), if 24 the tipped employee is notified in advance, is permitted to retain all tips and the 25 employer maintains accurate and complete records of tips received by each employee as 26 such tips are certified by the employee monthly or for each pay period. Even if the 27 employee refuses to certify tips accurately, tips may still be counted as wages when the 28 employer complies with the other requirements of this section and can demonstrate by 29 monitoring tips that the employee regularly receives tips in the amount for which the 30 credit is taken. Tip pooling shall also be permissible among employees who customarily 31 and regularly receive tips; however, no employee's tips may be reduced by more than 32 fifteen percent (15%) under a tip pooling arrangement.
