A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT TO INCREASE THE STATUTORY HOMESTEAD EXEMPTION.		
The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts: SECTION 1. G.S. 1C-1601(a) reads as rewritten:		
"(a) Exempt property. – Each individual, resident of this State, who is a debtor is entitled to retain free of the enforcement of the claims of creditors:		
(1)	The debtor's aggregate interest, not to exceed eighteen hundred dollars (\$18,500)seventy-five thousand dollars (\$20) in real property or personal property that the debtor or a debtor uses as a residence, residence or in a cooperative the that the debtor or a dependent of the debtor uses as a residence plot for the debtor or a dependent of the debtor; however debtor who is 65 years of age or older is entitled to retain terest in the property not to exceed thirty seven thousand in value so long as the property was previously owned by tenant by the entireties or as a joint tenant with rights of surformer co-owner of the property is deceased residence. - (12)Alimony, support, separate maintenance, and child support payments or funds that have been received or to which the debtor is entitled, to the extent the payments or funds are reasonably necessary for the support of the debtor or any dependent of the debtor.
- The debtor's aggregate interest, not to exceed three thousand dollars (\$3,000) (13)in value, in a burial plot for the debtor or a dependent of the debtor."

SECTION 2. This act becomes effective January 1, 2010, and applies to judgments and bankruptcy petitions filed on or after that date.

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
